othing happens by accident as I quickly learned on April 15, 1989 when I accompanied my cousin, Naomi, to a simple ham and bean supper at the First Spiritualist Church of Salem. At the time, I knew nothing about this religion or that there was such a person as a Spiritualist. Given that my religious background was perfunctory and I lived with family who were closed-minded, I was excited and curious to attend the supper because the mystery of where Naomi went to church and meditation classes would be revealed.

Unlike previous church functions that I had known, I was instantly aware of the friendliness, large attendance, and laughter. The people seemed to care about one another and shared a knowing. Later, Naomi showed me the little sanctuary lined with pews. I stood in the doorway in awe of its plainness, but soon felt a wave of something go through me. I have since come to know that it was spirit. I was speechless and felt that time momentarily stood still. As Naomi looked at me quizzically, I very calmly and with certainty said, "I've come home!"

I knew then that this church and all its wonders were for me to experience.

Later in the year, I moved to Salem all the while attending church and the Tuesday unfoldment class. It was a new beginning for me to explore in all areas of my life. I became very active within the church; therefore, becoming a member made greater sense to me.

My new found knowledge and faith within Spiritualism was put to the test on April 10, 1991 as I was having surgery. I had a "near death" experience which my doctor and the nurses corroborated. Yet, during that experience, I knew where I went. I always believed that there was an afterlife, and this religion continually proves it. I am forever grateful to Spiritualism and my temporary cross-over because I saw, felt, and heard that which is taught from the platform, classes, and books...it is comforting to know even as I continue to expand my knowledge and understanding. My earthly progression is enhanced tenfold each day due to Spiritualism and you, my friends. This is peace, love and gratitude. I give thanks.

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

declaration of principles

the board of trustees

The membership elected a new secretary, treasurer, and trustee, as well as reelecting two current trustees. The church now has two new board members serving for the first time: Laurie Drake and Gary Hansen. The election results were as follows: Laurie Drake, secretary; Joyce De Fazio, treasurer; Naomi Ellis, re-elected trustee; Pat Cizewski, re-elected trustee; and Gary Hansen, trustee to complete the term left vacant by Joyce De Fazio's election as treasurer.

On behalf of the board, the membership, and myself, a heartfelt thanks to Nancy Karolides and Rev. Elizabeth Gosselin for their many years of service, hard work and dedication. They do understand that although they are not on the board, their services are still needed and their work not finished.

the pastoral committee

The membership rejected the recommendation of the board to have a three (3) member Pastoral Committee for the short term. The membership felt more comfortable with a five (5) member Pastoral Committee. The members elected Mary Ciaramitaro and Pat Cizewski to the committee replacing Rev. Elizabeth Gosselin and Rev. Bradley Gosselin.

Because of the increasing demands on our time as missionaries and as an NSAC Board member (Brad), we felt that we could not make the three (3) year commitment to serve on the Pastoral Committee as required by a recent bylaw change. Though we have made the decision not to continue on the Pastoral Committee, we will continue our commitment to the church and the congregation being available to help and to serve, and as the only ordained ministers, to supply any other needed assistance.

The members re-elected Priscilla Herrick, Nancy Karolides, and David LeClair to the other three positions on the Pastoral Committee.

In accordance with our bylaws the new board and the new Pastoral Committee will assume their appropriate duties January 1.


by law change




